Cooperative Baptist Fellowship National Missions Offering

On Easter Sunday the Woman's Missionary Union (WMU) at UBC will be collecting contributions for National Missions. The goal is \$3,000.

The offering will go to CBF's Rural Poverty Initiative, which covers 20 of the poorest counties in the nation. The WMU is again focusing its emphasis on the CBF missions activities of Paula Settle, who ministers to three of these counties: Owsley County, McCreary County, and the community of Nada in Powell County, Kentucky.

In past years our offerings have helped many desperately poor families in Nada. The money has been used to provide baby cribs, do repairs in substandard mobile homes, purchase stoves and refrigerators, add bathrooms to homes that had none, replace roofs, provide improved electrical service, provide textbooks for Nada's first-ever college freshmen, construct several wheelchair ramps, and do many other projects like these.

A Bridge Across

We'll take our time as we need and want, we'll linger only to see what we can see, then we'll move along to the other end of the Bridge, to meet whomever the next Senior Minister should be.

This past Saturday afternoon, Karen and I were plowing through the papers, receipts, and financial detritus of 2016, hard at work on our tax return. For tax time number crunching, I like to use the calculator app on my tablet. It's a plainly laid out, straightforward standard calculator face with large keys for my fumbling fingers.

Well into our eye- and brain-wearying work, I paused to blow some bits of dust off my tablet screen. A quick puff was successful except for one stubborn speck that refused to budge. I started to flick it away with my finger, when I realized what I was trying to dislodge was my calculator's decimal point! (Yes, it was time to back away from the papers and go get some chocolate fuel.)

That little dot, that little speck, as my teachers liked to remind me and my fellow classmates, when misplaced or ignored, could wreak havoc in our lives, in and out of the classroom. An IRS auditor, for example, might get persnickety about where my decimal points lay out in our tax return forms and schedules.

When we grow weary with demands, we may quickly try to "blow off" the smaller details while pursuing a grander task. Or we may dismiss the minor characters in our day's drama. Or we may discount the part we ourselves play in whatever venture because, in our own eyes, we are the small fish in a big pond. Too often and so easily, we swipe away at the

decimal-point people, and we may disclaim ourselves as being of little consequence.

First, remember that the decimal point carries great power in every calculation, be it simple addition or tremendously complex computations. Our faith gives ample witness that God assigns similar power to the small ones through whom God does great work. Mustard seeds and mustard-seed faith are by God's design tiny things that grow great plants in both the natural and the spiritual realms of reality. (Matthew 13:31-32; 17:20)

And recall that God does not push away the failing nor the flailing persons when others would say, "Well, they're done for! Let's move along to find the better and stronger." Instead, Scripture testifies of God, "**a bruised reed he will not break, and a dimly burning wick he will not quench; God will faithfully bring forth justice...in the earth.**" (Isaiah 42:3-4). This declaration God first made about the community of Israel; then, God declared this same dynamic revealed in Jesus as God's Anointed One. (Matthew 11:20-21)

The seeming insignificance of other persons or efforts—and that seeming small bit you consider yourself to be at times—may be God's carefully placed decimal point that makes the all-important difference!
