Peace **SWATCH**

Last Sunday, the Advent theme was peace. During a season marked by overprogramming and overconsumption, peace seems anachronistic. It doesn't fit. This season leading up to Christmas often lacks any sense of peace. Yet, in John 14:27, Jesus said, "My peace I leave with you."

What is Jesus' peace? Defining peace is tricky because it is a family resemblance term. This means, according to a philosopher named Ludwig Wittgenstein, a concept like peace implies various parts of a category. The parts don't necessarily share a single defining characteristic. Instead, they are connected through a network of overlapping similarities. We have peace in the sense of an absence of conflict. We can also have a sense of peace, as in an inner calm. We can also find settings of peace, like a bucolic pond near some trees and a gentle breeze (i.e., picture a peaceful setting). These are branches of the idea of peace. They have overlapping similarities but lack a single defining characteristic.

When Jesus said, "My peace I leave with you," he did not imply something so narrowly defined as the absence of war or violence or a pond with leaves swaying in the breeze. The peace of Advent and the peace we can experience in Christ is deeper. The peace of knowing Jesus strikes deep in our sense of who we are. When we experience Jesus, we can find inner peace. Solutions for the complex problems of the world around us become clear, or with the peace of Christ, we can see life in the wider lens of God's big picture.

Wittgenstein suggests that we learn by rearranging what we know. Instead of limiting peace to the objective absence of violence, what if we understood peace in a new way? In Philippians 4:7, we read, "The peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

What is God's peace? It passes all understanding and can help us navigate this season and anything life throws at us.

Consecration Sunday Final Report

1. 80 giving units (couples or single persons) completed pledge cards committing a total of \$563,572.36 for the next 12 months.

2. Adding the expected giving of our other regular givers and non-donor sources (like parking income), we project our total church budget income over the next 12 months to be \$675,812.48.

3. Our total church budget income over the *past* 12 months was \$573,927.49.

4. This represents an increase in our total church budget income of \$101,884.99 (17.8%).

Qualified Charitable Distributions

Are you familiar with Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD)? A QCD might reduce the taxes you owe while helping your church. Here's how it works.

If you have an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) and are over 73, you are required to take a distribution from that IRA each year based on the value at the end of the previous year and your age. This is called a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), and generally the distribution is fully taxed as ordinary income. The form of the distribution may be in cash or securities.

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian to a qualified charity. This direct transfer can be in cash or securities, and it counts toward satisfying your RMD for the year. A QCD reduces your taxable income by the amount of such distribution since it is not included in your income.

Charitable giving is not about taxes. However, the tax benefit from a QCD encourages charitable giving and could enable you to give more money to what you love. With the recent increase in the Standard Deduction, many taxpayers will find that charitable donations no longer have any tax benefit. A QCD can restore some significant tax benefits for charitable donations.

assigned a job, "because everyone needs a purpose," Dianne said. "We didn't take over for them, we work along beside them."

In this series of Word articles, <u>Elizabeth Dow-</u> dy explains what *Worship+Wonder* is and how it is teaching our children to engage the parts of our worship services.

The stories and items the children have heard and made for their worship bags so far have introduced the first two movements of every worship service, *Gathering* and *Hearing God's Word*. Now we are ready to move into the third movement, *Responding* to what we have heard.

The act of *Responding* can take many different forms. In a service of worship, limited by time and space, symbols often stand in as commitments to larger actions that will continue long after we leave the doors of the church. Sometimes, our bodies are the symbols of our response. When hearing the proclaimed Word moves someone to commit their life to following Christ, they present themselves to the minister up front as a candidate for baptism. Other symbolic responses might include writing an intention on a card, taking a request to fulfill, placing a stone or lighting a candle to honor a loved one, or bringing a gift in an envelope to share. Each of these responses can be simplified down to one easy word: *Giving*. Giving of ourselves is fundamental to our response to God's gifts of love and grace in our lives. It is the walk that follows the talk of the Gospel.

For children, responding to God's message develops as a collaboration with parents and trusted adults. To help them, it is often necessary to *think small*, by breaking down projects into bite-sized pieces. "I want to help the homeless," can become, "I can help my parents and other grown-ups donate their old coats to a clothes closet this winter." "I want to save the rainforests," can look like helping to pack your family's snacks in paper sacks so less plastic packaging ends up in a landfill. Perhaps no parable of Jesus better illustrates what is possible when we *think small* than The Parable of the Mustard Seed. For kids, who need step stools to help in the kitchen and may not weigh enough to sit in the front seat of the car, the idea of starting with something small and insignificant to grow something as enormous and amazing as God's Kingdom speaks to them. You may recall that this was the first story I shared with the kids as an introduction to Worship+Wonder, in our Morning Worship service back in August. Since they had heard it before, this time I invited them to help me tell it. They recalled many of the phrases, word for word!



The tangible symbol the kids add to their Worship Bags with this story is a set of offering envelopes. Designed for children, these envelopes are imprinted with the words, "I thank God with... My Time _____, My Talent _____, My Treasure _____." This three-fold, alliterative motto of *Responding* as *Giving* is one framework for understanding how we can contribute to the work of God's Kingdom here and now. Put in other words, the gifts of our service, through hard work (our time) or our expertise (our talent), along with sharing our financial resources (our treasure), are the essential inputs of our participation in

God's work in the world around us. Even the smallest gift helps to grow God's kingdom of justice and peace.

A few weeks back, the kids wrote their names on the top line of their new envelopes and began to color in the friendly sheep. "I'm going to put some of my allowance in it," one eagerly responded. "What happens when I run out of envelopes?" another asked. I replied, "Come to me and I will give you more."
