Jesus, Truth, & Election Politics

In election season in the U.S., people's relationship with truth can become strained. Politicians and pundits make outlandish claims. Some of these claims seem to disregard any connection with reality. Others merely stretch the truth or exaggerate facts. As Christ -followers, what are we supposed to do?

Sometimes we can take a lesson from the parents of the early church. These men and women were working out what it means to follow Jesus in those first centuries after Easter. At that point, many of their writings were working out what we believe about God and Jesus in real time. They had earlier writings, so they could form ideas about God from what came before, and their writings articulated the further development of this notion of God.

For us, we can turn to Gregory of Nyssa who wrote that Jesus is truth himself. Think about that. Jesus is truth. Gregory writes, "The Divine Word doesn't want

us to be slave of anything; our nature has been changed for the better... He doesn't keep what he took, but purged our nature of evil." For Gregory, following Jesus means replacing all the bad parts in us with the good of Jesus himself.

When we become Christ-followers, we follow the embodiment of truth. Today, as we look at the political landscape, we do not find this same embodiment of truth. Gregory invites us to look upward at Jesus as the truth. Then, we ask, "What is he calling us to do?"

I invite you to hold up each decision you make each day in the light of Christ. As we go through our days, we can ask, "How does *this* or *that* bring glory to God?" This same logic is transferable to politics. Every candidate and referendum should stand for us in the light of Christ. When we hold up the choices for a political office to this divine light, what do we see? Neither will be perfect. However, abandoning the process leaves the choice to others. If every person except one decided not to participate in the political process, that one person would decide who represents everyone else.

Voting is not a biblical mandate and attempts to cite the Bible to support voting involve retrojecting twenty-first-century politics into a time when they didn't exist. Instead, we can take a biblical principle, like "Love your neighbor," and hold it up alongside our opportunity to participate in the political process. We can also examine politicians in the light of Christ and ask if they support biblical principles like "Love your neighbor."

I don't know what Gregory of Nyssa would say if he saw us today. I don't know if he would commend us as faithful servants or slap himself in the face out of disbelief. I do know that Jesus calls us to live out our faith (James 2:14-26). This might look different for each one of us, but that's the beauty of the priesthood of all believers and what I love about being baptist.

In this series of Word articles, <u>Elizabeth</u>
<u>Dowdy</u> explains what *Worship+Wonder* is and how it is teaching our children to engage the parts of our worship services.

An important part of any worship service is prayer. There are lots of forms for prayer in worship. An invocation prayer invokes the name of God and asks God's Spirit to be present and enliven our worship. A prayer of illumination asks God's Spirit to open our ears to hear God's message for us, through Scripture and its interpretation. A prayer of consecration dedicates someone or something special to serve or honor God. A worship service can include these and many other kinds of prayer, but there is one kind of prayer that we do almost every time we get together, in worship and at other times. It goes by several names depending on your church tradition, like Prayers of the People, or Intercessory Prayer. At our church, it is called Pastoral Prayer.

By its name, you might think that only a pastor can pray a pastoral prayer. If you were worshiping with us on Sunday, Kevin Adams, church member and chaplain, prayed our pastoral prayer on Sunday, and did so beautifully! So, what makes this kind of prayer pastoral? Well, the answer is in the story we use in Worship+Wonder to introduce prayer, "The Parable of the Good Shepherd." God, made known through Christ, is indeed the Good Shepherd. God knows us as a shepherd knows their sheep. God wants to take us to the good, green pastures. God longs to lead us beside the refreshing waters of life. God goes before us in times of trouble. God searches for us when we get lost. God carries us when we are sick and injured and nurses us back to health. We know the sound of God's voice like we know whenever we feel

love. A pastoral prayer is built on each of these aspects of our relationship with God.

Pastoral Prayers often follow a pattern known by the acronym PARTS. First, we Praise, or lift up, God's name. We Adore God, usually by proclaiming something great God has done. Thinking about the greatness of God can remind us of our smallness. So next, we Repent. That is, we admit the actions we regret, the ways we have missed the mark, or how we have let God, others, or ourselves down. Since we do this all together, this is a chance to think of the ways we participate in systems and structures that are unfair or harmful to ourselves, others, and the world around us. I will say more about this part of our prayer next week.

After we have acknowledged God, and taken a good, honest look at ourselves, we are ready to give our Thanks! In our prayer, we can thank God for all kinds of things, knowing that the practice of gratitude, no matter how small, contributes mightily to our own happiness and resilience! Lastly, we name our Supplications, or our requests and petitions, for ourselves or on behalf of others (which are also called intercessions). God wants to know what we need, what we want, and all the longings of our hearts. Indeed, like the Good Shepherd, we believe God knows the desires of our hearts before we even ask!

While there is a typical structure and pattern for Pastoral Prayers, there are many, many ways to go about it. At its core, it is a conversation between us and God. As Baptists, we don't have a printed book of prayers or special words that we have to say. Many of our kids already pray with their parents at bedtime and at meals. To help them begin to connect their family's prayer practice with what we do in worship, the kids are given a chance to make their very own Prayer Albums! On a

our youth choir directed by Will Cooke.


