Giving Thanks

As we prepare for Thanksgiving this week, I have been thinking about all the things for which I am grateful. Many years ago, I started a "gratitude list" on my phone. On this list, I type (or dictate) blessings, good things, people, events, and sights. Whenever I think of these good things, and have enough awareness to appreciate them, I try to write them down. Going back over the list can be overwhelming. Despite the problems of the world, I can see in vivid type-written characters that God is good, God has been good, and, in all likelihood, God will continue to be good.

Do wonderful lists of blessings mean that nothing bad happens? Certainly not. Bad things still happen, but they aren't the full story. Life is like a roller coaster. It's full of ups and downs, good and bad, and twists and turns. Our calling is to be faithful—not Pollyannaish (ref. Eleanor Porter's 1913 novel *Pollyanna*). When we are faithful to God, we can experience the ups and downs and twists and turns, recognizing that they are part of life's journey.

Instead of focusing on the bad, we can look for the good. It's always there. When we find something good, we can give God our thanks. Gratitude is a muscle, and the more we exercise it, the easier it gets to be grateful. In his first letter to the Thessalonians, Paul encourages the new Christ-followers to "give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:18).

Paul wrote to the Thessalonian Christians within a few months of preaching there. He cared deeply for them, referring to them as "siblings" 14 times in the short book. He wanted them to find the richness of a life in

Qualified Charitable Distributions

Are you familiar with Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD)? A QCD might reduce the taxes you owe while helping your church. Here's how it works.

If you have an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) and are over 73, you are required to take a distribution from that IRA each year based on the value at the end of the previous year and your age. This is called a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), and generally the distribution is fully taxed as ordinary income. The form of the distribution may be in cash or securities.

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian to a qualified charity. This direct transfer can be in cash or securities, and it counts toward satisfying your RMD for the year. A QCD reduces your taxable income by the amount of such distribution since it is not included in your income.

Charitable giving is not about taxes. However, the tax benefit from a QCD encourages charitable giving and could enable you to give more money to what you love. With the recent increase in the Standard Deduction, many taxpayers will find that charitable donations no longer have any tax benefit. A QCD can restore some significant tax benefits for charitable donations.

In this series of Word articles, <u>Elizabeth Dowdy</u> explains what *Worship+Wonder* is and how it is teaching our children to engage the parts of our worship services.

At the heart of every church's worship is the story–God's story. We hear it in the Scripture readings. We hear it interpreted through the sermon. We may have it expanded or illustrated in music, image, or drama. Through our worship, God's story is tied to and woven in with the story of us –our congregation, our community, our society, and our world. The broad strokes of God's story as it is told in the Bible become the shared language of God's people at all times and in all places.

For our children to be able to become Christian people, followers of God as revealed in Christ, they must come to know and love God's story. They must come to feel that they know it, not as a biblical expert, but as a deep well of wisdom, full of living water, that will be there for them whenever they are dehydrated by the exercise of making their way in the world. The way to foster that kind of knowledge is through repetition coupled with encouragement to wonder.

Since every Godly Play story is intended to plant and nurture a love of God's story in children, the task of selecting one story to introduce the preciousness of God's overarching story is daunting, indeed! For now, I have settled on the Parable of the Pearl of Great Price. This mystifying story turns our modern sensibilities upside down. Why would anyone sell everything they own? What could be worth divesting every last earthly treasure and comfort? Certainly not a tiny pearl, not even the largest in the set!

Children may be better poised to understand this kind of devotion than we adults are. After all, we have had more years than they have to develop an attachment to our things. Who

would know us without our distinctive car? Without our memory-laden wedding ring? Without our favorite shoes no one makes anymore? Things come and go for children, sometimes directly to a younger sibling or cousin right before their eyes! But they still understand the value of attachment, of having something that is theirs, and the pain of being made to separate from that thing. To do that voluntarily, with such willingness and enthusiasm, is a cost they can imagine and appreciate. They can understand that very few things merit that high of a bill, even hypothetically. That the grownups they know might have sacrificed, even in less dramatic ways, for their love of God, made known through God's story, is impressive to them.



Part of growing up as a Christian is the realization that you have been grafted onto God's family tree, and that God's story is your story, too. The gift of this lesson is the child's own Story Box. In the symbology of Godly Play, it is brown, not

gold. That is because it may or may not be used to tell one of the parables told by Jesus. The box resembles a gift because it is ours, even before we are born. The box has a lid, because we can return to it over and over again; it will be there whenever we are ready to hear the story it contains. The contents of the box are generic wooden figures with a yellow underlay. The child can decide which story the box will tell on any day they decide they are ready to open it. It belongs to them.



They could use it to retell the Parable of the Loving Father with two sons. In their version, they can play the part of the older sibling, or the younger

sibling, or the parent, or the pig! They could use it to tell the story of The Holy Family, journeying toward Bethlehem, imagining the conversation between the two expectant parents along the road. They could set the figures

Just as their lives stretch out before them with endless possibilities, so are the versions of God's story, intermingled with their own, they can rehearse and interpret in acts of playful worship.

I wonder...what part of God's story is invaluable to you? I wonder...which person or character in God's story comes closest to you? I wonder...what story do you most need to hear...or to tell...today?
