On Monday, December 16, 2024, in Madison, WI, there was another school shooting. Three people died and others suffered injuries. Police said the student who opened fire was among the dead. We know that this kind of violence is preventable, but we cannot say why it happened or why we-the-people are unable (or unwilling) to take the necessary steps to prevent future gun violence.

Advent means that we don't have to settle for what is. We can seek what can be, and we can work for it. God is at work today, in us, and through us. Right now, there are some hurting people in Wisconsin. If anyone, through social or familial networks has a way to be of comfort to the people in Madison who are in pain, then do so. If not, pray for them.

Qualified Charitable Distributions

Are you familiar with Qualified Charitable Distributions (QCD)? A QCD might reduce the taxes you owe while helping your church. Here's how it works.

If you have an Individual Retirement Account (IRA) and are over 73, you are required to take a distribution from that IRA each year based on the value at the end of the previous year and your age. This is called a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD), and generally the distribution is fully taxed as ordinary income. The form of the distribution may be in cash or securities.

A QCD is a direct transfer of funds from your IRA custodian to a qualified charity. This direct transfer can be in cash or securities, and it counts toward satisfying your RMD for the year. A QCD reduces your taxable income by the amount of such distribution since it is not included in your income.

Charitable giving is not about taxes. However, the tax benefit from a QCD encourages charitable giving and could enable you to give more money to what you love. With the recent increase in the Standard Deduction, many taxpayers will find that charitable donations no longer have any tax benefit. A QCD can restore some significant tax benefits for charitable donations.



Tomorrow evening at 6:00, we will take time for a Service of Remembrance in the Fellowship Hall. This will be a time to worship in scripture, prayer, and song and to light a candle in celebration and remembrance of a loved one's life or as a token of your prayers for a person or group struggling under the threat of mortal illness or danger.

Empowering Lives at the Crossroads CBF Offering for Global Missions

The Cooperative Baptist Fellowship announced this past spring a new position to strengthen and support CBF Global Missions' commitments to cultivate community, bear witness to Jesus Christ, and seek transformational development in the context of global migration.



Elket Rodriguez and his wife, Yesenia, are Puerto Rico natives who were displaced to the U.S. mainland in the wake of 2017 Hurricane Maria. Although not

technically migrants (Puerto Rico is a U.S. territory), they appreciate the cataclysmic change affiliated with uprooting family and relocating in a strange culture far from home. They are serving in Harlingen, Texas, on the eastern border between the United States and Mexico. In May Elket was appointed as CBF's global migration advocate.

His heart overflows with compassion for vulnerable people. In Puerto Rico he was a family and government attorney. Since coming to the states he has become an immigration attorney with a passion for assisting migrants in becoming U.S. citizens through the proper protocol.

Your generosity in support of the CBF Global Missions Offering and their mission programs will help and transform lives. From December 1 to December 31, we are collecting donations for the Offering for Global Missions. 100% of your gifts will support the longterm presence of CBF field personnel serving around the world. Advent Devotions

In this final article of the series, <u>Elizabeth</u> <u>Dowdy</u> wraps up her explanation of what *Worship+Wonder* is and how it helps children learn to worship.

Through story and practice, eight gradeschool children at UBC have been learning to worship this fall. They have practiced how to Gather together and settle themselves. They have learned about Praising God through the Church Year. They have been invited into a practice of Prayer and seeking Forgiveness. They have listened to and wondered about God's Word. They have been challenged to Give of themselves in response to what they have heard. There is one more practice they have been learning that completes their worship education for this season of *Worship+Wonder*. What grownups call communion, in W+W, we call Feast.

Feast is part of responding to God's Word; it is responding by receiving. On each first Sunday of a new month, the children eagerly retell what they have learned about the story of Jesus' last feast with his disciples. Then they serve each other communion. They receive the bread from one friend, then offer the bread to another. They dip their bread in the cup while it is held by their neighbor, then they hold the cup for their other neighbor to dip theirs.

When the children wonder how it is possible to "feast" on small cubes of bread and drips of juice, I invite them to think about what *is* abundant in our gathering. Sometimes silliness is plentiful! Giggling, wiggling, wonder, curiosity, and storytelling often bubble over in our gathering. Yesterday, there was an impromptu appreciation of snowflakes outside our windows. As one wonderer suggested, whenever we gather, we feast on God's love for us. Lately, we have transitioned from worship preparation and parable to hearing the Advent story. This coming Fourth Sunday of Advent, *Worship+Wonder* will spill out into the sanctuary into our annual No Rehearsal Christmas Pageant. The children will stay through the service, playing important roles in the story we will all tell with our bodies, our costumes, and our carols.

There will be one more item for the children to put into their worship bags when *Worship+Wonder* resumes in the new year. The children will put together all the pieces of worship into a new circle, The Circle of Our Worship. With a set of cards on a ring, they will be able to follow along with the grownups in worship whenever *W+W* does not meet...or they outgrow it.


As for *Worship+Wonder*, it will continue to teach the children about the seasons of the church year and the important stories it tells, all the way through Pentecost, before breaking for the summer. In this season of gratitude, I want to give my heartfelt thanks to the wonderful volunteers who have worshiped and wondered with us this fall and invite others to join this special serving team. I am excited about what *Worship+Wonder* will look like in the months and years to come.



Voces Laetae Concert

Every day of the year, The Haven provides a refuge, a place where anyone in a housing crisis can come to find the support and resources they need to survive and exit their crisis.

At 6:45 people arrive to take a hot shower and do their laundry, and then at 7:30 they can sit down to enjoy a hot meal, company, and conversation.

After breakfast, some head off to work, while others stretch out on a couch in the living room to catch up on some rest. A volunteer hands out socks, underwear, toothbrushes, hand lotion, and shaving cream.

At 10:00 another volunteer is taking a group of guests to the DMV to get new IDs and birth certificates, essential items to secure housing and employment.

At 1:00 a mobile medical clinic brings doctors and medical students to provide on-site care, and at 3:00 housing advocates are hard at work gathering information from a community member whose eviction is approaching and talking with a property manager, finalizing a lease agreement.

Did you know that every other Thursday volunteers from UBC take any leftover food from our Wednesday night dinners and donate it to The Haven!

This is just one way that we, often behind the scenes, are ministering to our community.
