Following Up on Video Screens

Occasionally, a question within a congregation can become unexpectedly troublesome. When that happens, the question becomes a distraction from what God is calling us to do. In this case, the question is about video screens in the sanctuary. It was apparent at the first listening session on this topic that there are a wide variety of reactions on the subject which need to be considered. I appreciate the open and frank discussion we had.

In a world facing imminent climate change impact, answering the question about using multimedia in the UBC sanctuary ranks pretty low. In a country divided along political lines, we do not need to feed polemics. In addition to the listening session on June 25, I have had a number of conversations with people about how we could or should use or not use screens. As a result, it occurred to me that, perhaps instead of pursuing this question now, we should focus our efforts on talking about how we can better share the love of Jesus with our community.

In The Screwtape Letters, C. S. Lewis writes a series of letters to a young demon named Wormwood from his uncle Screwtape. It is a brilliant classic that I recommend everyone read. In one chapter, he addresses the church and ways to distract someone from following Christ:

"When he gets to his pew and looks round him, he sees a selection of his neighbors whom he has hitherto avoided. Make his mind flit to and fro between an expression like 'the body of Christ' and the actual faces in the next pew. It matters very little, of course, what kind of people that the next pew really contains... Provided that any of those neighbors sing out of tune, or have boots that squeak, or double chins, or odd clothes, the patient will quite easily believe that their religion must therefore be somehow ridiculous."

How often do we, like Lewis's fictional Christian, let something small take our attention away from the reason God called us to be a church? Many of us do this at the individual level. Something bothers us and we let it grow. Until we resolve it or move on, that small thing can be a

stumbling block on our spiritual journey. When it is personal, we can either share it with others, and they can help us resolve our problem or get over it. Or, we can choose to not share it and let it fester.

We can also let a question, concern, or issue become a stumbling block within the congregation. What if, instead of continuing course, we paused? What if we changed our approach to refocus on God's purpose for us to be a church? What if we set aside our multimedia discussion for the moment to train our attention on becoming an inviting church? What would happen if we put our energy into figuring out how to move UBC forward together? For example, the nursery volunteers asked for a monitor to watch the worship service live. Church Council approved that request and putting a video board in the narthex to improve communications. These two small moves can, respectively, bring us together by drawing the nursery volunteers into worship and more effectively sharing information. What else can we be doing to come together and to engage with our community?

The questions in the previous paragraph should grab our attention. They can inspire listening sessions, brainstorming, and planning meetings. For the moment, we are going to cancel the second listening session (July 21) on multimedia and kick the topic back to the Deacons and Church Council. After they give it more consideration, the question might return to the congregation. Or, it might not. Either way, let us give ourselves to praying for God's direction as we follow Christ further into the twenty-first century.

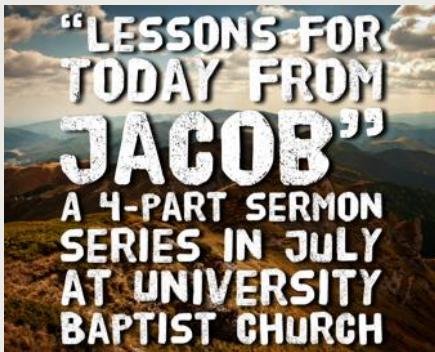
