## “Practicing Patience”

Some years ago, I was trying to fix my bike and realized that accessing the gears required a special tool—a gear cassette lock-ring tool. I didn’t have one and my progress came to a standstill.

When I am working on something, I want to get it done. In this case, I had the time and was ready to repair my bike. Not having the tool stopped my progress. Being self-reliant is generally a positive attribute. A willingness to jump in and get the job done completes tasks.

Since I wanted to fix my bike right then, I tried everything. Wedging some needle-nose pliers into the gaps didn’t work. A flathead screwdriver didn’t work. A hammer would be effective at bending the pieces but would do nothing to help. The only thing that made sense was to give up, go inside, and look up the tool online. It cost less than \$8. But I would have to wait until it arrived to keep working.

Opportunities to learn patience surround us. In Galatians 5:22-23, patience is the third fruit of the spirit. James 5.7 frames patience as an edict. “Be patient, therefore, beloved, until the coming of the Lord. The farmer waits for the precious crop from the earth, being patient with it until it receives the early and the late rains.”

The old saying, “Patience is a virtue,” dovetails with our faith. Jesus demonstrated patience with Pharisees, Sadducees, scribes, a lawyer, an unnamed woman, and, even, his closest disciples. They all did things to frustrate him. He reacted and often used the circumstances as teaching moments. Still, he usually did not lose his patience.

Between Paul, James, and Jesus, we have a solid basis for practicing patience in our faith journeys. *Practicing* is the

operative word. Patience doesn't come naturally to most people. If it comes easily to you, don't worry—there are other things you can work on. We all have spiritual blemishes and God is with us as we seek to grow.

For those of us who will mess up the end of a bike gear cassette for the lack of an \$8 tool, practicing patience is a spiritual discipline with practical implications. Being patient is not only good for repair projects, it is good for relationships. It allows us to pause and extend grace to one another. When Paul refers to it in Galatians, each fruit of the spirit fosters deeper faith. When James instructs Christ-followers to be patient, the idea connects with having perspective and taking the long view. In his analogy, farmers cannot plant and then grow impatient for the crop to grow. They must wait.

By focusing our spiritual growth on one thing, like patience, it becomes easier to digest. We can say, "Today, I will be patient in a situation in which I normally wouldn't." The following day, we can try to be patient in 2, 3, or more situations. With more practice, being patient gets easier. This is how we can grow.

We will still fall, but God extends grace, picks us up, and lets us try again. That's practicing patience.

Here is some information from Chaplain Jerusha Moses, whose ministry our offering will support:*



Dear friends,

Due to "separation of church and state," Gracelinside is a nonprofit Christian ministry that places chaplains inside Virginia's prisons so that lives may be transformed through the grace of Jesus Christ. As a Gracelinside chaplain, I am dedicated to meeting the spiritual needs of all residents of Virginia's state prisons. I currently serve in Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women, providing one-on-one pastoral care, conducting worship services, and working with the Department of Corrections staff in offering rehabilitative programs. I am also responsible for scheduling all religious programs conducted by volunteers representing many faith traditions like Islam, Messianic Judaism, Wicca, Buddhism, Seventh Day Adventism, and Protestantism.

As the temperature gets cooler and the leaves change color, I am reminded that God's mercies are new every morning; God continues to work patiently in our lives, transforming us, and sanctifying us to the likeness of the image of God's son, Jesus. What an honor it is to partner with the Savior bringing faith, hope, and love to incarcerated men and women, as Christ says in Matthew 25, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."

Bio:

Chaplain Moses is an ordained Baptist minister. She completed her masters degree in divinity and a doctorate degree in ministry at the Baptist Theological Seminary in Richmond. She majored in biblical studies and obtained a masters degree in theology at the Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond, Virginia. She taught World Religions as adjunct faculty at Virginia Commonwealth University. Her doctoral project was in the field of grief and loss. She lives in Richmond with her thirteen-year-old daughter, a stage 4 cancer survivor. Her grandparents were a major influence on her life; they retired from the Department of Corrections in India and told her bedtime stories of their work in Corrections. The stories took deep root in her impressionable heart and are the reason for her passion for prison ministry today.

## Collections for FCCW (Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women) Hygiene Kits September 1 - November 8, 2020

Yes, we are beginning early this fall to collect hygiene kits for FCCW, to give everyone ample time during the COVID pandemic to get your items to the church. Collection boxes will be located on the Ground Floor in the handicap entranceway (so you don't even have to come in the building), in the lobby outside the church office, and in the Narthex.

Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women, located in Troy, VA, seeks the support of individuals and churches for their inmate Christmas gift program, a ministry of the Chaplain Service of the Churches of VA, Inc. Through the generosity of so many, the Chaplain and volunteers are able to put very practical gifts into the hands of over 1,200 grateful inmates.

Please keep in mind that you must not deviate, even slightly, with regard to amount, size, or type of hygiene items, and they should be secured in a clear plastic zip-lock bag.

### Hygiene Items Ministry

- One individually-wrapped toothbrush
- One tube of toothpaste no larger than 6-ounce
- One alcohol-free bottle of shampoo no larger than 15 fluid ounces
- One alcohol-free deodorant stick (spray is not permitted) no larger than 2.4 ounces
- One alcohol-free bottle of lotion no larger than 15 fluid ounces





### Card Ministry

- One wooden pencil--unsharpened
- Greeting cards for all occasions including Christmas and Hanukkah
- Any stationery items
- Postage stamps
