Preparing for Holy Week

For many committed Christ-followers, the rhythm of the church year highlights various aspects of faith. During Advent, we get ready for the coming Christ child. At Christmas, we think about God-incarnate and how that impacts experiencing God. During Lent, we prepare for Easter. But, before we get to Easter, we have one final array of worship opportunities.

Holy Week traces the end of Jesus' earthly journey. We borrow different elements from the gospels and put together a picture. It begins with Palm Sunday. Jesus enters Jerusalem. In film adaptations, there are enormous crowds, shouting and cheering. Reality might have looked different. Still, we can imagine the dissonance between the shouts of "Hosanna!" and the cries later in the week of "Crucify him!" Palm Sunday puts us in the celebration and gives us pause to consider how we view Jesus. Is he a superhero? Are we like his first-century followers who wanted a savior to kick out the Romans? Or, are comfortable with a Savior who pushes us from our comfort zones and calls us to leave our nets to follow him?

Things get quiet on Monday and Tuesday. On Wednesday, we train our eyes on a character who is essential to the Jesus story: Judas. It's hard to imagine a scenario in which no one betrays Jesus. Maybe I have trouble because we have only ever known Jesus' Passion story with Judas' betrayal. Judas was a trusted follower who decided to nudge Jesus toward fulfilling the calling Judas understood. Judas wanted a superhero Messiah. He wanted someone like the person who entered Jerusalem in triumph on Palm Sunday. He hoped for a Davidic general who would kick the Romans' butts. Instead, Jesus was going to be the suffering servant and child of

humanity all along. Looking at Judas helps us find our own complicity in pushing God to do our own bidding.

Maundy Thursday is a centerpiece in Holy Week for many Christians. We mention it on the first Sunday of every month because Maundy Thursday began the eucharistic celebration we call the Lord's Supper. Jesus gathered with his disciples for the Passover celebration. They broke bread together and left an empty seat in case Moses showed up (as continues to be part of the Seder tradition in Judaism). After the meal, Jesus made some cryptic comments about the bread of life and cup of the new covenant. Only in hindsight did it make sense to the disciples, and from those strange words, we began this tradition of the Lord's Supper. John's Jesus also demonstrates the embodiment of service in love when Jesus washes the feet of his disciples.

Later that night, Judas plays his part. Roman guards arrest Jesus and Peter cuts off a soldier's ear. Jesus tells him not to fight and heals the man. In the midst of horror and violence, Jesus demonstrates love, compassion, and healing. His peace confronts violence and wins.

Friday includes a mock trial, the crucifixion, and death. It appears to be the end. Today, we have no trouble conceptualizing the new life looming just ahead at Easter. But, if we climb inside the story, we wait and our moods reflect the darkness of the tomb. Friday is the low point and the high point. Because Jesus died, we can see God's power over death.

The various pieces of Holy Week create a tapestry for faith to explode on Easter. Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. The celebration is bigger when we follow the entire path to get there. Join me as I get ready for the merry fête of Easter. We will pause at each stop along the way to appreciate the way it contributes to making Easter special. Let's get ready to experience the glory of the Lord.

Operation Inasmuch (OIAM) is University Baptist Church's own local mission outreach effort. In the past it has been a focused one-day event, usually the last weekend in April, that seeks to mobilize individuals to engage in hands-on projects for the benefit of those



within our Charlottesville community. Our OIAM for April 2020 was canceled due to the COVID pandemic.

The UBC Missions Council discussed OIAM at our last meeting and hated the thought of missing it again. While we are still not comfortable gathering 100 of us together for breakfast, or working in close contact with community members, we thought it would be a wonderful idea to commit April 2021 as a whole month of OIAM. We would like for families to seek out a project for a neighbor, church member, non-profit organization, family member or friend. Plan a date in April that is convenient for your family or small group, choose your recipient, and spend a day in service.

Previous OIAMs have included such projects as cleaning, painting, trash hauling, home repairs, and yard work for our elderly or disabled neighbors. We have done projects for local non-profit agencies such as the Ronald McDonald House, UVA Children's Hospital, the University Hospitality House, and WorkSource. We have done sewing projects for city foster kids, the children's hospital, and cancer center. Your project for this year can be as simple as raking leaves for a neighbor, making a couple of colorful pillowcases for the children's hospital, or whatever you dream up! Think of a project, decide on a recipient, work out the date and details with your recipient, gather your family or social pod, then let us know what you have chosen to do.

National Missions

Each Spring UBC has participated in the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship's National Missions Offering. This emphasis helps support our missionaries right here in the US. Last year, our Missions Council reached out to Scarlette Jasper, a CBF missionary working in southeastern Kentucky, where UBC has been partnered with missionaries for many years. Scarlette was commissioned by the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship as a field missionary in 2014, and now serves one of the poorest parts of the United States. There, she is the director of Olive Branch Ministries,

Inc <u>(olivebranchministriesky.org)</u> to address the needs of the local community. Some of the many needs that Scarlette helps address are: working with the homeless, coordinating childrens' literacy projects, rent and utility aid, assisting with transportation costs for distant



medical appointments, providing heaters or propane in the winter, supporting local schools with supplies, and helping veterans get needed services. She maintains a small mission house that serves as an emergency shelter and place for pastoral counseling. Like the majority of our field missionaries, Scarlette must raise her own program and project support. Last year, our church was able to raise \$2,255 to help support Scarlette's ministry to the communities she serves. Our contribution certainly made a difference in those communities, as Scarlette helped to provide food and hygiene items at the start of the pandemic, as well as assistance to the homeless and economically vulnerable through emergency shelter and rental assistance, and to help struggling students to maintain and improve their skills with reading and math games.

As we all know, the effects of the pandemic are still with us, and Scarlette is still active in her community to help with their needs. Our goal this year is to raise \$3,000 to support Scarlette and her work in Kentucky.
