Resituating Priorities

Isn't it strange when someone's action upsets us? I do not mean

our thirst for justice when we hear about someone doing something harmful to another person. I am talking about the people who have much in common with us, but with a slight variation. Churches that have a higher (too liturgical) or lower (too loosie-goosy) worship style are not wrong. They are different.

In Mark 9:38-41, John complained to Jesus about some people casting out demons in Jesus' name. John even confessed to trying to stop the exorcism because the exorcist wasn't part of the club. Cue Jesus planting his face in his palm. He responded to John, "Don't stop him... whoever is not against us is for us."

The world presents us with opportunities to join John and criticize how other people practice their faith. This one is too loud. That one is too abrasive. Another isn't assertive enough. This one doesn't have enough passion about their beliefs. If we join John's chorus of disapproving commentary, we find the logical conclusion: *everyone needs to be like me*. No! God calls us to be like Jesus.

The temptation to disparage other Christ-followers is a stumbling block. When we miss the good in others' faith journeys, we are poorer. When we add negativity, we build up the stumbling blocks. In Mark 9:42, Jesus says, "If any of you put a stumbling-block before one of these little ones who believe in me, it would be better for you if a great millstone were hung around your neck and you were thrown into the sea."

His words sound harsh because he takes the faith journey so seriously. Disrupting or tearing down someone else's journey is terrible. It's bad for the victim. It's bad for the one doing the tearing. And, it's bad for the kingdom of God.

that lives may be transformed through the grace of Jesus Christ. As a GraceInside chaplain, I am dedicated to meeting the spiritual needs of all residents of Virginia's state prisons. I currently serve in Fluvanna Correctional Center for Women, providing one-on-one pastoral care, conducting worship services, and working with the Department of Corrections staff in offering rehabilitative programs. I am also responsible for scheduling all religious programs conducted by volunteers representing many faith traditions like Islam, Messianic Judaism, Wicca, Buddhism, Seventh Day Adventism, and Protestantism.

As the temperature gets cooler and the leaves change color, I am reminded that God's mercies are new every morning; God continues to work patiently in our lives, transforming us, and sanctifying us to the likeness of the image of God's son, Jesus. What an honor it is to partner with the Savior bringing faith, hope, and love to incarcerated men and women, as Christ says in Matthew 25, "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me."

Bio: Chaplain Moses is an ordained Baptist minister. She completed her masters degree in divinity and a doctorate degree in ministry at the Baptist Theological Seminary in Richmond. She majored in biblical studies and obtained a masters degree in theology at the Union Presbyterian Seminary in Richmond, Virginia. She taught World Religions as adjunct faculty at Virginia Commonwealth University. Her doctoral project was in the field of grief and loss. She lives in Richmond with her fourteen-year-old daughter, a stage 4 cancer survivor. Her grandparents were a major influence on her life; they retired from the Department of Corrections in India and told her bedtime stories of their work in Corrections. The stories took deep root in her impressionable heart and are the reason for her passion for prison ministry today.
